


Children's Moment



The first week of Advent is about hope, and 4,600 feet below the surface, we meet the purple octopus (grandeledone boreopacifica). In March 2007, marine biologists encountered a particularly special purple octopus mother. For fifty-three months, this mama held onto her eggs until she believed they were ready to hatch. It was the longest brooding period on record of any animal on earth. Octopus eggs are extremely vulnerable to being eaten by other creatures, and so the mother octopus must stay with them until they hatch and swim away. This one protected her eggs for four and a half years. In her book, How Far the Light Reaches, science writer Sabrina Imbler asks what else we would call this if not "something like hope." A hope for her babies and their future, hope in herself to know when to give her babies the safest moment to be born, to give them their best chance.

Like the mother octopus, I wonder how Mary might have experienced hope in an unknown future when the angel Gabriel told her about God's plan—or perhaps, about God's hope in her. Mary didn't know what exactly the road ahead would be like, but I wonder if it was hope that helped her say 'yes' that day. A hope for a future worth staying steadfast for, day by day, even if we cannot know how it will all turn out. Hope that God will be there no matter what comes. Hope that calls us to show up with love today that is always connected to tomorrow.

Where do you find hope? Who or what has helped you do so? What do you hope for this Advent season?

Spiritual Exercise

Instructions:

This exercise is inspired by a cento poem, which is when a poet writes a new poem from the words of two or more poems written by other authors. For our exercise, we'll use the Hebrew scripture passage and second Christian scripture reading from this Sunday.

First, have one or two people read the readings out loud. As the passages are being read, notice what words or phrases grab your attention, speak to you, draw you in, have energy, etc. You might want to underline, circle, or highlight them.

Then, read through the readings silently on your own, again with the intention to notice what words or phrases speak to you.

Finally, take a look at the words you've underlined or highlighted and use them to compose a poem or a reflective statement. You do not have to use all of the words or phrases you marked or put them in any particular order. Just see what comes out when you put pen to paper! There's no right or wrong way to do this. See how Spirit is still speaking through the words you've been given. Have fun!
